A Royal Horse Herd roamed the hills of Rancho Viejo - For real?

A History of Rancho Viejo, Part II by Sarah Henderson



Continuing our exploration of Rancho Viejo history, based on a report by Tigges Planning Consultants in 2000 (Rancho Viejo, Sitio Antiquo, 2000) we learn that permanent habitations were found on the periphery of the area. Rancho Viejo itself was used by hunters and gatherers for subsistence, later for grazing of domesticated animals (originally for the nearby mission estancias of the late 16th century, later on land grants and ranches) and throughout its history for traveling.

I find the latter usage the most compelling, with diverse and often conflicting cultures crossing the easily traversed corridor. Beginning as footpaths used by Archaic and Puebloan peoples, the trails would see missionaries, officials, soldiers, refugees, Apaches, Comanches, traders, settlers and miners. The area saw the Spanish flee the Pueblo Revolt of 1680 and return 13 years later: Don Antonio de Otermin, the governor of Santa Fe, with "all of the refugees, animals and two wheeled carts...rolled through the Rancho Viejo plain" (p.7) toward San Marcos where they would seek shelter and allies. What a sight to imagine. Then, along the same routes, incursions of the (not peaceful!) Reconquista. Having earlier re-entered Santa Fe through the Santa Fe Canyon, when Don Diego de Vargas came again in 1693 he brought 800 families, sheep, horses, and mules" through Rancho Viejo to Santa Fe."

Rancho Viejo in the 18th century witnessed raids by the Comanche, a trail to the salt lakes at Galisteo, the establishment of land grants (often conflicting and disputed), and the abandonment of many neighboring pueblos and missions. The report states that the land was probably shared as pasturage by a succession of several families. And at one time the "Royal Horse Herd" grazed there!

Next up-the 19th century-still a thoroughfare, now for colonizing Americans.

Communication Committee April 2019 by Sally Dillon, Chair

The Communication Committee met on March 18, 2019 to work on this newsletter and 2019 La Entrada events. More information will be forthcoming in future newsletter publications as planned events are fine tuned.

In the next few weeks depending on the weather, the layout of the interior of the Message Centers will be completed. The cork backing has been installed and some signage for upcoming events has been posted. The Message Centers are located at the mailboxes both on the north and south sides of Rancho Viejo Blvd. on Calle Agua Clara. The north Message Center required a new door be made, so in the meantime, we are covering with thick plastic to keep the inside dry. Once completed, both Message Centers will have locked doors. As we work on the layout, we will divide the Message Center's interior into sections to display notices from the La Entrada HOA, La Entrada Communication Committee, the RV Ladies Group, and the Rancho Viejo Neighborhood Watch for La Entrada. Requests for additional notification space will need to be approved by the La Entrada HOA board, or the La Entrada Communication Committee. Any notices attached to the outside of the Message Centers will be removed immediately and discarded. A better option for those notices is to post them on Nextdoor.com, as those postings will go to a much larger population of people.

At La Entrada's recent HOA Annual Meeting, the board approved the 2019 Budget. The community events budget included funds for the purchase of the *La Entrada Community Events Wagon* (a trailer with ramp) and contents that includes tables, chairs, a chair rack, coolers, a potential grill, a canopy, and other miscellaneous items. This will help us considerably in time and efficiency by not having to rent these items each time we have a community event.

Speaking of events, we are excited to add a **Fourth of July** event for La Entrada. Get your pooches ready for a forever entertaining pet parade, fun carnival games, and a delicious cook out. Check out the flyer in this newsletter and mark your calendars for this family event - It might end up topping the list as one of our favorites. How fun is it going to be to watch our La Entrada pets trotting about in patriotic regalia?

Sales within Rancho Viejo have remained strong. This has lead to being sold out of lots for houses from 1367 square feet to 1900 square feet. With this, Estancia Homes is working on getting new lots under construction. During the spring Estancia Homes will be working on developing 24 new lots that will be for sale this summer.

Recycling Reminders

If a specific homeowner does put glass into his recycling cart on a regular basis they will be warned, and, should that practice continue, MCT will no longer provide recycle pick-up at the home. Also please note that the garage cart and recycle cart need to be placed at least 3 feet apart.

In April, recycle pick-ups will be on April 10 and 24, and May pick-ups will be on May 8 and 22.
