Animal Ambassadors Visit La Entrada

On the first of June, La Entrada hosted animal ambassadors from the New Mexico Wildlife Center (NMWC) near Espanola in our very own park on Punto Nuevo for a fun and informative presentation by Alex, the center's Outreach Coordinator. Visiting us were an elderly Bull snake (yes, you could pet her in the direction of her scales please; and no, she is not cold and slimy), a Box turtle (if you have one, make certain they have a warm, dry place to hang, as well as water), and Pancho, the center's beautiful little American kestrel (10-12"). The center's mission is wildlife re-habilitation and release; animal ambassadors such as our guests on this day are unable to be released back into the wild because of their habituation to humans, or intractable physical issues; instead, they serve as educational tools for us.

NMWC has a hospital and veterinarians to treat injured and orphaned wildlife brought to them from all over the state, and facilities for their rehabilitation. Animals that can be brought to them include raptors, songbirds, turkey vultures (who have a very compelling defense mechanism which involves, um, vomiting), mammals (deer, bobcats, even mountain lions), and snakes. Alex and the center do caution, however, that you cannot assume a baby animal has been abandoned by its parents, for that

is rare, and "humans are not acceptable substitute parents."

Visiting the center, the hospital, the animals, staff and volunteers is

amazing! My personal favorite is Joni the bobcat. The rattlesnakes are very interesting, too, and I know that parents who enjoy hiking with their children will want to bring them to the center to learn how to properly identify the good from the bad, and subsequently steer clear of the dangerous ones. The center does, of course, accept and aid those that have been injured, for instance by garden netting.

Everyone, I feel, especially the kids, really enjoyed the program. Alex and friends do a stellar job and are available for presentations in classroom settings as well.











Red Quilt Solidarity Project

On a bright, sunny June day, I interviewed Tina Sparks over Frozen Strawberry Lemonades and friendly conversation, but I first met Tina this past spring as she was working on her Senior Project at the Institute of American Indian Arts (IAIA). Her art school journey began in 2016, after taking her 2 youngest daughters on college tours, and now, both Tina and her daughter Amalia attend IAIA, located here in our community.

Fast forward to the fall of 2018. . . Tina solidified the focus of her Senior Art Project to an important and timely topic – raising awareness of Missing and Murdered Indigenous Women (MMIW). In the US, Canada, and frankly world-wide, Indigenous Women experience abuse, trauma, and become missing or murdered at alarming rates. As of 2016, over 5700 Indigenous women and girls were reported missing and/or murdered, according to the federal National Crime Information Center. This is information that the average person may not be aware of, but the crisis is real. United States Congresswomen for NM, Deb Haaland, serves on the House Natural Resources Subcommittee that held hearings seeking solutions to the Missing and

Murdered Indigenous Women Crisis. https://haaland.house.gov/media/press-releases/haaland-gives-voice-silent-crisis-missing-and-murdered-indigenous-women

As a result of initiating the Red Quilt Solidarity Project, Tina was invited to advocate for Missing and Murdered Indigenous Women and Girls during the 2019 state legislative session. She attended three out of four Senate Committee Hearings with proposals pertaining to Missing and Murdered Indigenous Women and Girls, led by the late Senator John D. Pinto, a WWII Navajo Code Talker. After the four sessions, New Mexico Senate Memorial 38 was passed by both houses. https://legiscan.com/NM/bill/SM38/2019 SM38 gave formal support of US Congresswomen Deb Haaland's call for a National investigation of Missing and Murdered Indigenous Women and Girls, and a \$100,000 task force for MMIW has been established.

The Red Quilt Solidarity Project, Continued -

The Red Quilt Solidarity Project began in January, 2019, when Tina and her two youngest daughters made the very first quilt. She opened a Facebook page for the Project and printed some flyers, both of which promoted the Call For Art. In February, she began circulating flyers to invite and encourage other artists to create panels of quilting, painting, weaving or mixed media that are 60 inches tall, any width, and approximately 50% red. This is how I met Tina. I created an acrylic painted panel of 7 Southwest Pueblo-style Pots with missing sherds. At the bottom of the painting, the sherds reappear with red painted hands reaching for help. The background went from a calming turquoise through white to an angry, unsettled red. As of this writing, my artwork, 18 additional submissions from across the country, and Tina's keystone quilt piece are still on display, Monday-Friday, in the halls of the IAIA Library Building. The keystone piece is a magnificent quilt in red, white and blue, containing design elements that signify returning home and change. Tina created a matching dress containing the same colors and design elements as the keystone quilt, and wore the dress during the opening night of the project exhibit. By wearing the dress, being tied to the quilt by red ribbons extending from the center of the quilt, and standing in solidarity for Missing and Murdered Indigenous women, she makes the visual statement that "we must become the message" for MMIW. On the back side of the installation, there is an empty red shawl supported with a wire structure and suspended from the ceiling to allow the viewers of the project to stand inside the shawl, thus standing in solidarity for Missing and Murdered Indigenous Women.

This project will remain open for submissions through 2020, inviting and encouraging more artists to participate in the Red Quilt Solidarity Project. The goal is to gather many quilts and panels to make a large visual statement addressing violence against women, specifically Missing and Murdered Indigenous Women. The long-term goal of the project is to transport the RQSP to Washington, DC, and display all of the submissions on the national mall—much like the AIDS Quilt from the 1980's—stitching art and activism together to create visibility, funding and change. I may create another panel, because the project focuses on such an important issue for Native women and our entire New Mexico community. It is crucial to raise awareness of this important issue in order to improve investigation, legislation, and strategies to protect Indigenous women, and all women, going forward.

Neighbor to Neighbor 8th Annual Food Drive

All residents in Rancho Viejo are welcome to make donations to The Food Depot to help in their work against the reality of hunger in Northern New Mexico.

Many neighborhood associations across Santa Fe are participating in a one-day "Neighbor to Neighbor" Food Drive.

The Neighbor to Neighbor Food Drive will be held on Sat morning Sept. 21st near the north mailboxes on Calla Aqua Clara. This year there will be no donation bags distributed to residents. Here are some other ways people can help out in addition to the Neighbor to Neighbor Food Drive:

<u>General Operations</u> \$1 provides four meals for those in need

The Food Depot is the food bank for Northern New Mexico, providing food to those in need through more than 145 nonprofit agencies such as food pantries, shelters, youth programs and senior centers.

Food 4 Kids \$120 sponsors a child for a school year

Food 4 Kids provides backpacks of nutritious child-friendly food to students known by school personnel to be hungry, to tide the children over at home in the evenings and on weekends when their families may be unable to provide meals.

Mobile Food Pantry \$175 sponsors a person for a year

The Food Depot's Mobile Food Pantry provides nutritious food distributed by a network of community volunteers to residents of isolated rural communities where there are high rates of hunger and poverty.

<u>Diaper Depot</u> \$50 provides diapers for a baby for a year

The Communication Committee met on July 21, 2019 to plan upcoming events and to work on this newsletter. Information about upcoming events is in this newsletter. Future events will be described in later issues of the newsletter.

We will be freshening the headers in our Message Centers soon. We have been focused on getting cards and craft items completed for the August 24 Raptor Event. As a reminder, any notices attached to the outside of the Message Centers will be removed and thrown out. A better option for those notices is to post them on Nextdoor.com as those postings will go to a wider group of people in a larger area. Facebook events is another option.

We have been using the contents of our Event Wagon/Trailer. We may consider adding 2 more pop-up canopies and the weights to the trailer for next year. We will assess other needs in time for HOA budget meetings.

The Wildlife Center Event on June 1st was very successful, except for needing to stop a little earlier due to a severe thunderstorm warning. We wanted to keep everyone safe, and chose to pack up the trailer a few minutes earlier than scheduled. We had over 50 people in attendance, including many children. We have added Facebook Events from our new Facebook page to our advertising, as well as postings on Nextdoor. We also had e-blasted notices out to residents, put copy in the newsletter and Message Centers, and posted information on our website.

We used the same advertising strategies for the July 4th Event, revving up excitement with the pet and bicycle parade, cookout, lawn games, and watermelon-eating contest. Additionally, we had different stations for hand washing, and a pet station providing water and treats. There was even Cotton Candy! Game stations included Bubbles, Giant Jenga, Lawn Darts, Marshmallow Golf, Corn Holes, and playground equipment available to use. We did run out of hot dogs, but will plan accordingly next year.

LA ENTRADA HOA MEETING REPORT June 20, 2019

After the HOA meeting was called to order, Serenity Lucero, HOAMCO Manager for La Entrada went over the financials. There was a discussion regarding a process for sending the financials to the homeowners prior to the meeting, or having some copies available at the meeting. It was decided to have several copies of financials available at the meetings, as well as emailing them to homeowners with the meeting notice.

There was discussion about Drones because they have returned. If we know of a homeowner who is violating the rules with a drone, then we can send them a letter on compliance. If we do not know who is operating the drone, unfortunately there is not much we can do in that case. Cass will discuss the issue further with the attorney.

Trash cans to be placed near mailboxes have been ordered. Proscape will maintain them.

Regarding landscaping in common areas, dead trees are being replaced, hydro seeding has occurred, and streetscapes should be done by now. It was noted that the T park is still under the Developer, and the HOA will not take it over until maintenance is scheduled by Proscape.

Other topics discussed included spraying for weeds, night sky ordinance alignment, a request for "Dogs Must be on Leashes" signs for the open spaces at the trail heads, maintaining a 'Sense of Community,' enforcement, barking dogs, and the ongoing issue of construction trash.



Recycling Reminders

Paper, clean plastics and cardboard can be mixed together in the cart. However, No **GLASS** should ever be put into the recycle bin. If you wish to recycle glass, you can do so at the Rancho Viejo Recycling Center.



If a specific homeowner does put glass into his recycling cart on a regular basis they will be warned, and, should that practice continue, MCT will no longer provide recycle pick-up at the home. Also please note that the garage cart and recycle cart need to be placed at least 3 feet apart.

In August, recycle pick-ups will be on August 7 and 21 and September pick-ups will be on September 4 and 18.
