### **Raptor Release**

On August 24th the La Entrada Communication Committee hosted the Santa Fe Raptor Center and their educational birds for a release of two Great Horned Owls at the IAIA hogan. The mission of the Raptor Center, located in El Rito, is "Rescue Rehab Release" and applies to "all native injured or orphaned birds from all around New Mexico". Director Lori Paras gave a program with her pals George the Swainson's Hawk and a little burrowing owl. Educational birds may be those that have been injured and despite treatment (the center has an amazing, dedicated veterinarian on staff) cannot be released or used as foster



p a r e n t s . Injuries include being struck by cars, becoming entangled in barbed wire, and, shockingly, being shot. Lead poisoning caused by feeding on carcasses of

game that have not had the shot removed also occurs, and the indiscriminate poisoning of rodent prey can be responsible as well.

The two beautiful owls were released in an area with appropriate habitat and prey, and were a lovely sight to watch fly away. Check out the Raptor Center's website and Facebook page for many more pictures of the incredible work they do.

# Communication Committee October 2019

Since we have many new residents, it seems like a good time to talk a little bit about RV/La Entrada's Communication Committee. While we do plan and execute community events, we are not a social committee. There is no social committee. This Communication Committee started back in 2009 when Suncor was the Developer. We are an offshoot of that HOA Board. We are resident volunteers who wish to serve our community as it grows. Volunteers are community members who step in to serve as their schedules allow, and step down when life re-directs them to altered purposes. We are all volunteers.

Even though HOA board members may not serve as a chairperson of a committee according to HOA documents and bylaws, we always try to have at least one HOA Board member sit on the committee.

The initial charge of the Communication Committee was to develop strategies to communicate and relay information to residents. The strategies developed included creating uniform signage to be posted on mailboxes, although within the last year or so, the mailman has been removing and discarding our signage per postal regulations, so we have switched to the new Message Centers at both mailbox bays, north and south of Rancho Viejo Blvd. Other strategies included fleshing out a very skeletal website. Several members of the committee attended a training seminar with AtHomeNet, the company that hosts our website. They provide further training, technical support, and website security preventing hacking.

As technology improved, HOAMCO, our HOA Manager, was able to blast email out our communications, flyers, and general information approved by us to send out.

For the Committee, one project that was a focus was the Welcome Packet, used to disseminate information to new residents. It was later found that when Committee members attempted to deliver these packets, new residents were either not home or did not choose to answer the door. In the last couple of years, the Welcome Packet has become more streamlined and is included with closing papers for new home purchases, and are included in the resale homes purchasing process as well.

In an effort to expand the sense of community, we started with a Holiday Party and began collaborating with the Rancho Viejo South Community with events such as "Coffee and Conversation." A hard copy newsletter was also developed, published, and mailed in conjunction with Rancho Viejo South. The cost for printing and mailing the hard copy newsletter became quite expensive, so the La Entrada HOA Board and Communication Committee made the decision to go digital. This allowed us to focus exclusively on life in La Entrada, to display many more color images of our community, and to include information on approaching meetings and events. All of the newsletters from 2011 through to the current issue are available on the website. This is the history of our community. The website has all HOA Documents, Charter and Homeowner's Manual that includes community regulations, and the Design Review Committee (DRC) form, Volunteer form, RV Neighborhood Watch Alerts, and Reserve Studies. One of the committee members created a widget for the Public Home Page of the website for the three most current newsletter links to display. This is a good way for potential homebuyers to learn about La Entrada and Rancho Viejo. There is an address book on the website, but the most accurate list of residents is the list that Serenity Lucero, our HOAMCO HOA Manager, has as she receives all contact information after the closings. She also approves website logins, as we do not have information regarding specific closings.

#### **Communication Committee, Continued**

Over the years, we have phased out the "Coffee and Conversations" which tended to be more of a presentation, and have created activities that appeal to all of our residents. In 2019, we have had six events and sponsored two additional events. We tend to work with some non-profits with some activities. We create and use directional street signs to direct people to the different events. This year we have added Facebook Events and Nextdoor, as communication tools to get the word out to more people. We partner with Amy Biehl Community School, and the Rancho Viejo Ladies Group. Finally, we have purchased an event trailer this year and have stocked it with tables, chairs, canopies, coolers, lawn games, etc.



Notices for the Message Centers must be approved by the HOA Board and/or the Communication Committee. As a reminder, any notices attached to the outside of the Message Centers will be removed and thrown out. A better option for those notices is to post them on Nextdoor as those postings will go to a larger group of people in a larger area. Facebook events is another option.

At the recent Neighbor to Neighbor Food Drive for the Food Depot, we collected \$805 in monetary donations and 778lbs of non-perishable food from both the Food Drive and from the La Entrada Community Picnic. As \$1 equals 5lbs of food, our total pounds are 4803lbs of food for northern New Mexicans with food insecurity. Thank you to all who contributed. If you missed the Food Drive, you can still donate and mark your check with N2N La Entrada in the memo.

At the recent September 23rd Communication Committee meeting, the Committee worked to plan the October/ November 2019 newsletter and assigned articles to write. The La Entrada Communication Committee meets every other month for the purpose of planning upcoming events and to organize articles for La Entrada News. A special thanks to all who serve on the committee for all they do to support our community. We have had a great year of events and all our facets of communication. Our last event of 2019 will be the Holiday Party, but our communication never dies . . . we'll be back for a December/January newsletter.

It needs to be in Word or Pages and completely ready for publishing. "Completely ready for publishing" means formatting, editing, captions, logos, and active web links, etc. Photos and articles need to be sent as attachments in an email to Sally by the 15th at the very latest. The Communications Committee works as a team in assisting the publication of the newsletter and shall determine if there is room for article(s) depending upon space constraints and content. The editor and the committee reserve the right to edit and/or include submitted articles. If approved by the Communication Committee, the article will go in the next newsletter. If it is submitted after the deadline, it may be placed in the following issue of La Entrada News, unless it is time sensitive content that is now after the fact or not approved. The reason we have these deadlines is to align with our schedule for publishing. We have specific tasks to accomplish and events to plan. If a submission is late or not "completely ready for publishing," it throws us off of what we need to do for publication.

La Entrada News is published generally around the beginning of the publishing month, and it is also posted on the La Entrada website at http://www.laentradaatranchoviejo.org/home.asp . An email blast from HOAMCO is then sent out to residents with the website URL and directions on how to locate the newly published newsletter. The hands-on Citizens academy runs for 12 consecutive weeks in two-hour sessions every Thursday evening. This Academy starts on Thursday, October 24. Sessions begin at 6:00pm and are held at the main Police Station at 2515 Camino Entrada (across Cerrillos Road from Appleby's). Instructors from Santa Fe Police and the Santa Fe County Sheriff's Departments will deliver the training.



# **Directions for Shutting Down Irrigation Systems in La Entrada**

1.) Purchase an irrigation valve shut off tool at Home Depot, Lowes, or Ace Hardware. The tool is a long bar with a two-prong fork at the bottom and a "T" or "V" handle on it, and is about 4 feet long.

2.) Remove the yellow cap off of the Irrigation valve, located around the sewer clean outs and irrigation boxes.



3.) Use valve shut off tool to close the valve at the bottom of the sleeve by turning it clockwise until it stops.




4.) In the irrigation box that holds your electronic valve, turn the top part that has wires in it counterclockwise about 1/4 turn to open the valve. The valve top has "open" and "close" with arrows written on it.

5.) Off to the side of the valve there is a "Y" in the line with a cap on it. Remove the cap and place with other parts in a plastic bag back in the irrigation box. There will be water in the box because the system will drain to the box.



6.) On any small green lid boxes, and the end of line in the backyard, please remove the caps so the system can drain down. Place all caps in the small boxes for replacement when the system is turned backed on in the spring.



7.) For spring start up use these directions in reverse.

### La Entrada Rancho Viejo Pet Rules & Regulations

#### F. Animals

- 1. Animals or pets of any kind shall not be raised, bred or kept on any Lot except dogs, cats, and other typical household pets, which shall be permitted as long as their numbers and ownership does not create a nuisance and complies with Santa Fe County regulations. Raising, breeding or maintaining animals or pets is not permitted in any Common Area.
- 2. All Pets must be held or kept leashed at all times when in Common Areas, open spaces, trails or on the walkways or roads.
- 3. Pet owners must immediately pick up all waste and litter created by their pets anywhere within the La Entrada at Rancho Viejo Property boundaries and in walled yard areas.
- 4. Dog owners are responsible for ensuring that their dogs do not bark excessively and are not a nuisance to other Owner or Occupants in the community.
- 5. Horses, mules, burros or other animals shall not be ridden on Association Property, except in areas expressly designated for such use.

Your dog won't become reactive because they don't have to feel stressed about interacting with strange dogs and people.
